FORMALDEHYDE AND THE RV By Sue Heist

When Betty Ann asked if I would write an article on formaldehyde for the newsletter my mind went immediately to biology lab and frogs, worms and fetal pigs. Perhaps not everyone gets to experience opening a jar of formaldehyde solution and fishing out your frog for lab. It is a smell one never forgets after that.

Now let's discuss the serious part. There appear to be two issues. One is the carcinogenicity of formaldehyde and the other is what formaldehyde does to septic tanks.

Lets start with carcinogenicity. Refer to the U.S. National Institute of Health, www.cancer.gov. In 1987, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) classified formaldehyde as a probable human carcinogen under conditions of unusually high or prolonged exposure in. Formaldehyde can be found in many building materials and household products, pressed-wood products, glues and adhesives, permanent-press fabrics, paper product coatings and certain insulation materials. It is used in industry as a fungicide, germicide and disinfectant.

Formaldehyde is also a by-product of normal metabolic processes. This means there is always a low level of formaldehyde present in the air, usually less than 0.03 parts per million. If the level exceeds 0.1 ppm some individuals, such as me, may experience one or more of the following; watery eyes; burning sensations in the eyes, nose and throat; coughing; wheezing; nausea; and skin irritation. Some people are just normally sensitive to formaldehyde while others aren't.

The adhesives and pressed-wood products used in most RVs will give off formaldehyde when they are new. This is especially noticeable when it is hot and the vehicle has been closed tightly for long periods. The mobile homes donated for victim of Katrina are examples of this. A RV sales person told me that they often put trays of kitty litter in the shower stalls of new RVs to adsorb as much of the "new" odor as possible.

If formaldehyde isn't a carcinogen under normal conditions and assuming most RV owners have found ways to reduce the odors from the RV components why worry about putting products containing formaldehyde in the RV sewage system? Formaldehyde is only one of many chemicals that shouldn't be used in RV sewage systems.

The EPA and many states are regulating RV parks and owners of dump sites more closely than they used to. Septic systems have two major components: a septic tank and an absorption field or leachfield. The septic tank separates solids from liquids and promotes partial breakdown of contaminants using “good” aerobic bacteria. If the bacteria in the system are killed the system cannot treat waste adequately and when this happens chemicals and untreated wastewater can contaminate nearby ground water, rivers and streams. If RV parks owners don’t take measure to control hazardous chemical disposal into their waste treatment systems and their system causes contamination they may be forced to close the dump station or the park until the problem is corrected. Clean up is costly and can take years.

What is true for the dumpsites is also true for the RV tanks. So conscientious RVers should take certain precautions. A partial list of things **NOT** to put in the RV waste system:

- Chemical treatments (some contain formaldehyde)
- Chemical odor maskers
- Bleach
- Methanol
- Alcohol
- Laundry detergents
- Disinfectants (formaldehyde is one)
- Toilet bowl cleaners
- Homemade concoctions; pine oil, automatic dishwasher detergent, mineral, coconut, or cooking oils, yeast
- Cleansing powders
- Polishes
- Sink & tub cleaners
- Antibacterial soaps
- Pesticides
- Any petroleum-based product
- Acids
- Cleaning fluid

All of the items listed above have a negative impact on the aerobic bacteria that are necessary for the proper functioning of sewage treatment systems both in the RV tanks and dump stations. With ample air, which enters each time the toilet is used, and water, these good bacteria decompose waste efficiently in the holding tanks. If the system is functioning properly, minimum odor should be produced, which with proper venting should not be a concern. The vent pipe must be just through the top of the waste tank, not submerged so that it is blocked. It should be check periodically to make sure it isn’t blocked elsewhere, especially at the roof.

Because of these issues most RV forums recommend the use of bacterial holding tank products. They also say that the available enzyme products won’t do any harm and can sometimes help. Active aerobic bacteria are what the RV owner needs to have a properly functioning holding tank system so lets keep them happy.


The group observed automated construction of building trusses and learned about the company's growth and modernization.
